INTRODUCTION:

The guidelines below are based on knowledge of theory and research about how children develop and learn; they reflect the growing consensus among early childhood professional organizations that a greater emphasis be placed on young children's conceptual learning, acquisition of basic skills, and participation in meaningful and relevant learning experiences. They delineate the content that children are encouraged to learn and achieve at the completion of academic year. These guidelines provide a means to align our Pre Kindergarten program with the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) as well as the guidelines established by Montessori Educators.

Given the fact that the fact that each learner is unique; Everest Academy strives to provide instruction based on each individual's strengths and needs; in a relaxed and safe environment of comfort and collaboration that is conducive to learning.

LISTENING AND SPEAKING SKILLS:

- Following simple directions
- Understanding Verbal Commands
- Listening attentively for different purposes to educators and audio aids (tapes, records, etc.) and showing understanding through gestures, actions, and/or language
- Responding appropriately by answering questions verbally
- Repeating a sentence of 6-8 words
- Repeating a sequence of orally given numbers
- Building vocabulary
- Contributing to group discussions
- Refraining from 'baby talk'
- Communicating in complete sentences

SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SKILLS

- Respecting rules and authority
- Exercising self-control
- Getting along with peers
- Working co-operatively
- Orderly Transition
- Being polite and helpful
- Identification of human feelings

SELF RELIANCE AND INDEPENDENCE

- Feeling secure in environment
- Working independently

WORK HABITS AND LEARNING SKILLS

- Observing, exploring, and investigating
- Following directions
- Organizing tasks and following sequence

- Knowing first and last name

FINE AND GROSS MOTOR SKILLS

- Walking, running, hopping, skipping, sliding
- Walking in a straight line
- Being able to stand on one foot for 5-10 seconds
- Throwing ball
- Holding crayons, pencils

- Holding and using scissors
- Using paints, glue

READINESS SKILLS

- Print awareness: Functions of print, directionality, Correct way of handling books
- Reading picture books
- Memorizing poems and rhymes
